A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

ON ANOTHER European night at Anfield, I should like first to welcome the players and officials of C.S.K.A. Sofia, the U.E.F.A. delegate, M. Edgar Obertufer, and the match officials. I might add that M. Obertufer, a former Swiss international and now secretary of the Swiss Football Association, is no stranger to Anfield. He is also one of the most popular figures in European football.

We forged some extremely good relations with CSKA Sofia when we met them for the first time a year ago, and I am sure that this friendship and sporting rivalry will be maintained tonight. I am also confident that we can rely upon our own supporters to uphold the reputation of Liverpool F.C., as the U.E.F.A. delegate keeps an eye on things.

Once again, I must stress that clubs competing in Europe cannot afford to incur the displeasure of U.E.F.A., and that crowd troubles—of whatever nature—can bring severe penalties for the home club. Remember that we are held responsible for what happens on this ground tonight.

So I urge every single one of our supporters to do nothing which could jeopardise the standing of this great club. There must be NO encroachment on the field before, during or after the match. And I am sure that our loyal supporters will appreciate the point I am trying to put over.

Finally, let me just add that we certainly do want your cheers... Give the Liverpool players all the vocal encouragement possible, and help them to produce the result which will put us half-way into the semi-finals. It's up to the players to do their stuff—and up to our fans to give them the right kind of backing. All the way.

CRUCIAL TO GET THE RIGHT RESULT HERE

THERE IS one thing of which you can be certain of tonight... Liverpool won't be going into this European Cup quarter-final tie thinking that it's going to be easy against CSKA Sofia. The scoreline may have been 5-1 here the last time we met; but I know my players recognised that CSKA were still a good side.

A year ago, just about everything went right for us, as we saw the shots going in. But Liverpool's players acknowledged afterwards that the scoreline made our opponents appear to be a worse side than they really were. So there can be no complacency, no feeling that it's going to be an easy demolition job this time. For my money, it's going to be HARDER.

The Bulgarians have just come back to action after their mid-winter break, which means that we have had only a brief chance to take a close look at them. Yet their record speaks for itself... more than 20 years of European competition, champions twice on the trot... and a victory over Nottingham Forest last season which showed that they can produce results.

CSKA Sofia have just about the same squad of players as they had 12 months ago, so the team is that much more experienced and it will have gained something from being together during the past months.

It may be thought that in knocking out Real Sociedad and Glentoran, CSKA haven't pulled up any trees in the tournament this season, so far; but they have done the job demanded of them, and you cannot ask for more. By the same token, we are through to Wembley in the League Cup—but we haven't won anything yet, so that's all the more reason for us to pull out the stops tonight.

Our experience in the F.A. Cup a few weeks ago should serve to make us wary; and the plain fact is that we know we must apply ourselves for every one of the 90 minutes tonight. It's crucial that we get the right result here. Need I say more?

THERE HAVE been times when Phil Neal almost missed playing in a match for Liverpool. But he's kept right on going, and with more than 325 consecutive first-team matches behind him, he is looking forward to another milestone in a career which now spans close on 630 appearances.

Because, when we meet C.S.K.A. Sofia in the away leg of our European Cup quarter-final, Phil aims to chalk up his 50th game in European competition—a tally which now makes him our most experienced campaigner against Continental opposition.

Phil has maintained his remarkable record of consistency for appearances. Only a few weeks ago there seemed a danger that he might have to miss a match because of injury, but he was there, as usual . . . and it's not the first time he has made it against the odds.

Phil can remember a time when he suffered a depressed cheek-bone injury on a Saturday, had an operation 48 hours later, and—admittedly, against doctor's orders—played again the following Saturday.

As he said later: "I didn't want to be left out, and I knew the risk I was taking. Another crack in the same place, and it would have been very serious."

Last season, Phil broke a toe during a game against Arsenal at Highbury; the injury meant that for days he couldn't wear a shoe on the foot, so he walked around with one foot bare.

On match day he wore odd boots—one was size 6½, the other two sizes bigger. With the help of painkillers he got through the game.

And on another occasion, when he went down with food poisoning before a League match against Sunderland, Phil still managed to line up for the kick-off.

Last season finished on a couple of high

notes for Phil, because—for the third time in his career with Liverpool—he helped to bring home the European Cup, while there was also the pleasure of playing in England's World Cup qualifying victory over Hungary in Budapest.

This season, England have beaten Hungary again, at Wembley, and ensured that they qualified for the finals of the World Cup in Spain. And with Liverpool still on the trail of the European Cup, the First Division championship and the Football League Cup, this year could well mark one of the highlights of Phil's whole career . . . and he's enjoyed some notable success, so far.

For the record, the last time Phil missed a match with Liverpool was on October 20, 1976 . . . and, oddly enough, that was a European tie against the Turks of Trabzonspor. And more than seven years have gone by since Phil first pulled on a Liverpool first-team jersey.

It was November 16, 1974, when Phil—who was manager Bob Paisley's first signing—got the word that he would be playing in the derby game against Everton at Goodison Park. Liverpool earned a scoreless draw, that afternoon . . . but Phil has turned out to be a real winner since he arrived from Northampton Town.

Phil Thompson wasn't the only Liverpool player on Denis Law's list for Spain, (see page



6), because the Scot put Phil Neal ahead of rivals such as Viv Anderson (Nottingham Forest). He said he rated Phil "a better full-back than when he came up against Dominic Rocheteau (in the European Cup games with St. Etienne)" and added that Phil was "defensively good, with a surprisingly firm tackle." In fact, Denis Law offered the opinion that of the full-back candidates, Phil Neal's place in the England side looked the most secure.

WORLD CUP HEARTENER FOR PHIL

IT HASN'T exactly been the Cup that Cheers for Phil Thompson, because it was in a League Cup-tie that he received the injury which cost him his place in Liverpool's first team, and this meant that when he had regained fitness he had to start fighting his way back via the reserves. But one man who had some words of consolation to offer Phil was a former star who himself missed a European Cup final through injury—Denis Law.

Denis tipped Phil to claim a World Cup place with England, saying: "If he's fit, he must go to Spain . . . even if he's also in Liverpool's reserve side. His passing is first-class and he reads a game well at the back. His best partner is Dave Watson—they've played together on many occasions and go well as a pair."

Phil (pictured leading out Liverpool against AZ'67 Alkmaar) was the first to acknowledge that, once out of the side, it's a battle to get back in—but he can take heart from the Law verdict and from his call-up to the England squad last week.



MARK SAYS HE'S 'NO REGRETS' ...

THE MAN who came into the centre of the defence—Mark Lawrenson—when Phil Thompson was injured, has earned some glowing compliments from the likes of Frank McLintock and Welsh-international team boss Mike England . . . and both of these men are former centre-halves. Frank McLintock rated Mark as being "dominating at the heart of the defence", while Mike England voted Mark the best centre-half in the League.

But Mark himself, who admits he doesn't mind where he plays, so long as he's in the team, went on record like this: "I think I've played better when I was in a struggling side at Brighton." And the Preston-born player had "no regrets" about opting for the Republic of Ireland . . . as he said, "I've had five years' experience with them which I might never have got with England."



CLICKETY-CLICK... NOW YOU KNOW!

THE television cameras helped to solve a mystery when they put the Liverpool players under focus recently. It was a case of clickety-click . . . and now you know! The spotlight was on marksmen, and their reaction to having scored, and it was pointed out that as each player turned away from goal, he was seemingly giving

a wave of the hand.

Bruce Grobbelaar was called in to explain that, in fact, it all started with Terry McDermott and the signal was that of a jockey cracking the whip, with one finger producing the clickety-click effect as the hand was waved up and down.

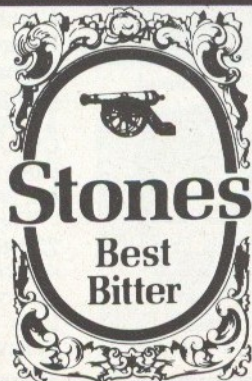

WELCOME BACK

IN FOUR European Cup matches this season, CSKA SOFIA have conceded two goals and scored four, as they have progressed to the quarter-finals by disposing of Real Sociedad, from Spain, and Irish Leaguers Glentoran. And their playing squad is virtually the same as that which tried conclusions with Liverpool last season.

As before, CSKA are coached by **Asparuch Nikodimov**, and the first-choice goalkeeper remains **Georgi Velinov**, with **Toschka Arsov** (who played in the Sofia game last season) the back-up man as last line of defence. Velinov, still only in his mid-20's, has had more than 30 outings at various levels in representative games. He is now in his third season with CSKA, while Arsov—two months his junior—has been with the club for two years.

The brothers **Georgi** and **Dinko Dimitrov** have been regulars in the side this season, but one name conspicuous by its absence when CSKA kicked off against Real Sociedad was that of **Ivan Zafirov**, who skippered the side last season and had totalled close on 400 games and almost half a century of international appearances. He is still in the squad, however.

At 23, Georgi is the elder of the Dimitrov brothers by two years, and both are highly-rated defenders. Georgi has made several international appearances, and Dinko—who can operate as a sweeper—first made his mark as skipper of the Bulgarian junior side. There is a third Dimitrov in the squad—and his name is **Aliocha**.

Also in CSKA's list of defensive players are **Georgi Iliev**, **Anguel Kalbuurov**, **Metodi Tomanov**, **Georgi Bezinsky** and **Zono Vasilev**. Iliev, Kalbuurov and Bezinsky have been regulars in the European Cup campaign. Kalbuurov, a 26-year-old, is noted for his hard tackling, while Vasilev, aged 30, has played against England in an international career spanning around 30 matches.

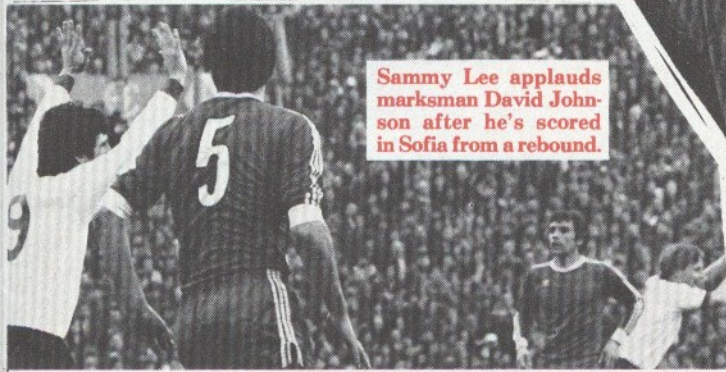
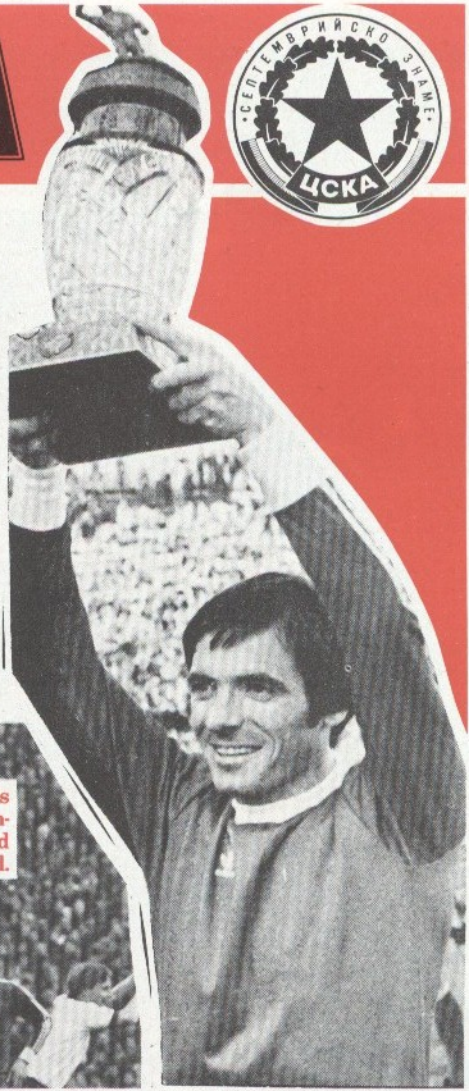
Iliev, aged 25 and easily distinguished by his height, is the man who is usually given a tight-marking job to do, and last season at Anfield he wore the No. 3 jersey, with Zafirov at No. 2 and **Radoslav Zdravkov** in the No. 6 shirt which Iliev normally wears.

CSKA have several players in competition for midfield places, and they include **Plamen Markov**, **Istvan Yonchev**, **Rudzhi Kerimov** and **Nikola Velkov**, who can operate also as a striker, playing wide. Kerimov, too, has a reputation for being able to make forward runs in support of the attack, while Yonchev, an international still only in his mid-20's, has earned a reputation as a play-maker.

Markov is 24 years old, and he has become a real favourite with the CSKA fans, as has **Spas Djevisov** who, for his size, has excellent close control and packs a powerful shot in his left foot—which is why he has earned the tag of "the Puskas of Bulgarian football."

The CSKA squad is completed by **Mario Vulkov**, another striker, 25-year-old **Stojtscho Mladenov**, who has become a regular this season, and **Angel Rangelov**, who wore the No. 5 jersey here last season. So far the goals have come from Yonchev (two minutes from time in the first leg against Real Sociedad), Dinko Dimitrov and Zdravkov (against Glentoran in Sofia) and Djevisov (in Belfast).

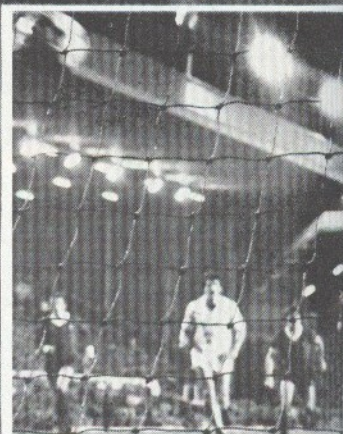

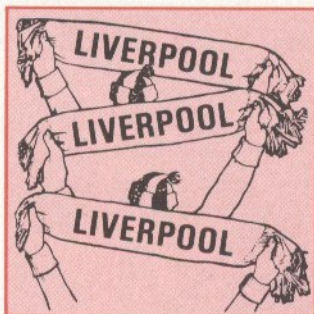

MARY MACKINS —A 'HEROINE' WHO FOLLOWS US AROUND

THE LETTER from Mrs. Eileen Saunders, who lives at Tunbridge Wells, ends like this: "I hope you find the information interesting and amusing enough to use". So, having started at the end, we'll turn to the beginning.

"Although we live in Kent, we are great fans of Liverpool and take every opportunity to see them play. A 'home' game for us means up at 4.30 a.m. and on the road by 5.30 a.m. for the round trip of 523 miles, arriving back home at about midnight.

"The real heroine of the piece is my friend, Mary Mackins, who reckons she does more miles to see Liverpool than she does for her firm. She tries to arrange her work schedule around Liverpool's mid-week matches.

"Apart from home and away games, we got to Wembley for the League Cup final last March, and you've no idea how much crawling I had to do to get tickets. However, getting tickets for the replay was much easier.

"Unfortunately, our seats were in the West Ham section and as we were wearing red



rosettes the size of dustbin lids, we really stood out among thousands of supporters in claret and blue. They gave us a lot of stick, but we had the last laugh.

"I couldn't get to the European Cup final in Paris, but Mary did. The fact that she hadn't a ticket didn't stop her. She can be very persuasive at times, as some poor French guy found out . . . she pleaded with him so much that, with tears in his eyes, he sold her his ticket for less than he was originally asking.

CSKA CELEBRATE

IT WAS a repeat performance by CSKA Sofia, as they carried off their domestic championship for the second year in succession, to qualify again for the European Cup. And this gave them their 21st League title, while they have won their Cup competition 10 times.

Only Levski Spartak (13 times) have won the domestic Cup competition more often than CSKA, but Levski are well behind when it comes to title successes, for they have been champions on 13 occasions, and last season they finished in second place to CSKA.

Twelve months previously, the finishing order had been CSKA, Slavia Sofia and Levski, with CSKA totalling 46 points, Slavia 45 and Levski 37. This time out, CSKA lost four matches out of the 30 they played, and finished with 40 points, although they were four ahead of Levski, so they won the championship comfortably.

MEN IN THE MIDDLE

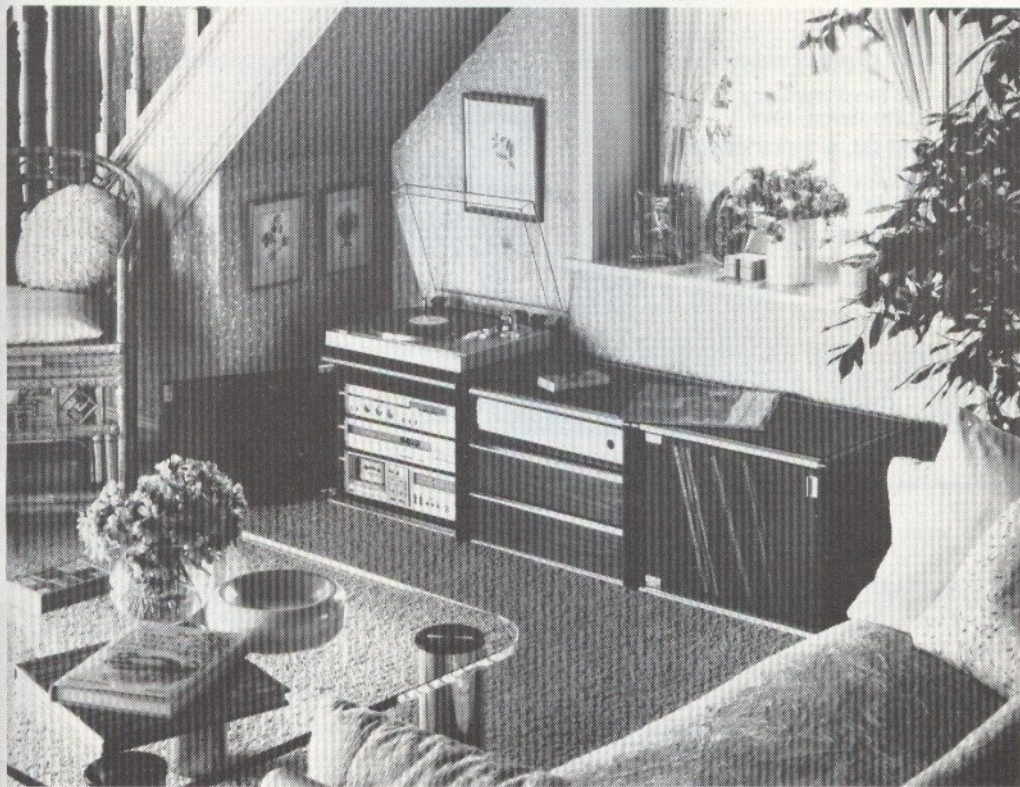
